Records of the New Providence Presbyterian Church on Turkey Creek, N.J. show that Aaron and 3 of his children were baptized there between 1764 & 1775. Church's seating list include: Abraham Clark, David Clark, David French and Aaron French. About 1787or 88, moved to Washington Co. PA where he acquired 400 Acres of land lying 4 mi. SW of Amity and partly within the present Greene Co. PA. He named it "The New Republic".

Charles Newton French in his genealogy "Aaron French and Descendants" states:

" During the Revolutionary War, Aaron lived in a part of New Jersey which suffered much at the hands of the British. Many church, town, and other records were then lost. That Mary Clark was the name of the first wife of Aaron French is traditional, but it is so generally accepted that the compiler accepts it as true. It is said that Aaron had 2 or more brothers, one of whom removed to N.Y and another went south. It is said that Aaron of New Providence, NJ, Joseph of Raritan Landing, and Francis of New Gretna were sons of Joseph who was son of Thomas, Jr."

Since Joseph French and Allee were married in Shrewsbury, Monmouth Co., NJ and Aaron was born in Monmouth Co., NJ, I have assumed that Aaron is the son of Joseph who was the son of Thomas, Jr. and grandson of Thomas French, II. 2nd Resolved that Thomas Osborn, Henry Willits, Francis French, David Caviller, Joseph Berry, Samuel Deacon, Robert Pharo, Stephen Willits, Jeremiah Mathis, Senr. Eli Mathis, are appointed a committee to put the laws in force respecting gethering oysters out of season and unlawfully taking or raking on the oysters beds under pretense giting shell to burn into lime or any other pretence whatsoever and sd committee are informed by sd township each and every of them to put the law strickly in force against every offender that they may know of either from personal knowledge or by complaints made to them by any person or persons and this township meeting agrees to pay all reasonable expence that may accrue. 1814 DEED FROM JOHN LEEK TO FRANCIS FRENCH FOR 10 ACRES IN LITTLE EGG HARBOR:

This indenture made this second Day of May in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred & fourteen Between John Leek [Note: John Leek III who was John Leek's grandson] of the township of Little Egg harbour in the county of Burlington and state of New Jersey, yeoman, and Hepzabah his wife of the first part and Francis French of the same place yeoman of the other part. WITNESS that the said John Leek for the consideration of the sum of five hundred dollars . . . BEGINNING at a Pine tree standing in or near Ridways's line marked and lettered FF & JL thence running North forty five Degrees East until the same strikes the mill pond on the above mentioned creek [Wilets creek] or branch then

running a northerly course up the pond the several courses thereof to the head of the same thence crossing the branch and thence running southerly down said mill pond until the same strikes the line of Francis French thence running on a line below the saw mill until one chain(?) thence crossing the branch to the place of Beginning. Ten acres be the same more or less it being a part of a survey belonging to John(?) Ridway and a part of a survey belonging to John Leek . . . Deed Book A-2 , pp 430-1; 5/2/1814

I Francis French of the Township of Little Egg harbour in the County of Burlington & State of New Jersey being indespos in body but of a sound mind and perfect in Memory but considering the uncertainity of this mortal Life do make and Publish this my Testament and Last Will in manner and form following that is to say principally and first of all I will that my just Debts and financial Charges be paid by my two Executors herein after named. Then I authorize and give full power to my two Executors to sell one hundred acres of Meadows made in five surveys about Cape horn & Willits thoroughfare also any part of my other property that they think best in any way they choose to sell it and convey the same as fully and Lawfully as I could have done it in my lifetime so much as will Raise money to pay my Debts Except such parts as I have given to my wife and my son Thomas French. Then I give and bequesth unto my son Thomas French and to his heirs and asigns forever all that plantation that I purchased of Able Gale it Lyes in three Lotts and according to the Resurvey that I made they contain one hundred and twenty five acres, also one equal half of my share of that tract of meadows that I purchased of Caleb Cramer called the Schofield meadow. Likewise a tract of pine & oak Land that I purchased of Sykes survey for forty Eight acres, but under this that is he shall not sell the tract of forty Eight acres of pine and oak Land nor any timber off of it under six years and During the said six years My other sons Jacob & William French shall have Equal Right with my son Thomas to cut timber for their own building on their place or places but Jacob & William shall have no more Right after the six years is Expired. Then I give unto my well beloved wife Phebe one half of my sawmill and Gristmill and all my household and Kitchen Furniture (Except the Clock) in perticular the Bureau and two best tables all of these I give unto her During her widow hood and also my two sons Jacob & William shall find and keep a good milk cow for my wife and provide plenty of fire wood to make her fires. Then I give and bequeath unto my son William French and to his heirs & asigns forever all my full share and Right in that meadow that I and my son Jacob French purchased of John Cramer Howel and his Mother. Then I give and bequeath unto my sons Jacob & William French and to their heirs and asigns forever all the Residue and Remainder of my Lands seder swamp & meadows with b oth the mills (Except their mother Right) and all the privilidges and profits thereunto belonging or in any wise appertaining as part or parcel thereof, and all the Remainder of my moveable property (Except what I have given to my wife and them also at the Death or marriage of my said wife) to be equally Divided between these their heirs or asigns such as Cattle horses, sheep & hogs with all my former utencils and all and every thing not heretofore given away. Then I Nominate Constitute and appoint my son Jacob French & Eli Mathis my Executors to this my Testament & Last will Revoking & Disallowing all former will by me made or intended to be made Ratifying and Confirming this only to be my Testament & last will in Witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand & seal this twenty sixth Day of the tenth month October in the year of our Lord one thousand Eight hundred & nineteen 1819.

Signed, Sealed, Published and Declared by the said Francis French to be his Testament and Last Will, in the presence of Francis French- his mark X each other who have set our names as Witnesses and in the presents of the Testator.

By this sudden and afflictive event, this immediate section has sustained a loss of one of its most valued and useful citizens. The deceased was distinguished for business enterprise far in advance even of his persevering neighbors. He was ever foremost and practically in the active pursuits of toilsome, laborious life, and may really be considered as having fallen a victim to his unceasing devotion to business, never having been afflicted with sickness of any character previous. He was at work while the disease was grappling with his strength, nor could he give up until the 'King of Terrors' had almost shorn him of his power, and laid him prostrate. In his extended business relations, he was noted for integrity, promptness, and consideration. As a neighbor, he was conciliatory in his intercourse. and he was eminently social and jovial. As a man, he was humane, and highly respected, as was manifest by the large concourse that assembled at his obsequies. But a few weeks since, Mr. French. in deep grief, led his family around the grave of a much-loved daughter, who was also smitten suddenly down, in the full blush of her morning of life. But yesterday, the stricken and heart-broken family followed him to the same cold tomb. How afflicting a Dispensation !--Truly it can be said that Death hath been among us as the 'strong man armed,' but He that taketh away can give 'beauty for ashes, the oil of joy for mourning, and the garment of praise for the spirit of heaviness.' It is too bad that THE HERALD has no regular correspondent from New Gretna; it isn't because we are

all ignorant but because we are all too busy at our daily avocations. If we had any retired doctors, lawyers or merchants, I have no doubt but that you would have plenty of notice from New Gretna and as a word of encouragement to the readers of THE HERALD, I will say that I think before 1885 shall have drawn there will be several retired merchants in our town, for stores are too thick to thrive. Yet each firm seems to possess some requisites which are essential to success. For instance, B.M. French & Co., have the capital and stand; Adams & Bro., are workers and persevering; Cramer is attentive and very anxious to do business, so anxious that sometimes we are told he sells below cost; perhaps he is like the woman who sold brooms at ½ c. below cost, who when told that she could not be making much, replied: "Oh, I sell so many of them or I would not." BASS RIVER, May 24th, 1886. To the Editor of The Herald: Capt. Tom French seems to be much out

of humor over the opposition to the proposed road and bridge across the river. You can see where it pinches him. He has reformed greatly since he sold out his valuable property in this township and purchased a farm in Atlantic county. He sold out here because he wanted something to eat and could not get it here such as he wanted. He also gave other excuses but the greatest of all was the high taxes. His farm cost him about \$2500 at Chestnut Neck and he hopes to advance its value by saddling heavy tax on our township and both counties. When high taxes are to his advantage he favors them. This may be enterprise and it may be self-interest. Men of good judgment estimate the road will cost Bass River township more than \$3000 and they know as much as Capt. Tom. The meadow and marsh is soft and spongy in the bottom, exposed to the storm tides and the muskrats, not to mention other drawbacks. According to Capt. Tom there are two men in Atlantic county in favor of the bridge and one is himself. A great many people call Chestnut Neck the jumping-off place. [signed] NOT A DELINQUENT TAX-PAYER Mt. Burlington county was invaded Thursday last by Atlantic county Board of Freeholders. Director Currie was in command of the company.

The expedition was organized to view the site of the proposed Mullica river bridge near Chestnut Neck. Leaving Absecon in carriages at 11 A.M., the party drove through not very picturesque nor mountainous scenery to Chestnut Neck arriving there at 12:30. They inspected the road which is being built and is nearly finished to the Mullica river bank as an extension of the Port Republic road from the farm of John W. Johnson and through that of Capt. T.E. French. It consists of a foundation of pine log trimming, apparently coming from the mill, varied on both sides and filled in with meadow muck, to be topped with gravel.

Crossing the historic battlefield of Chestnut Neck the company swooped down upon Capt. Daniel Rose's oyster scow, which for then once was turned into a private yacht or ferry on which the invaders were soon safely landed in Burlington county. On that further shore they were met by Winfield S. French, William R. Lipponcott and Horace G. Ireland, the committee appointed by Burlington county to receive them.

Winfield S. French, as chairman, explained that the site was the narrowest part of the Mullica river which they found feasible for the building of the bridge. The channel was 28 feet deep, and the tide very swift during its rise and fall. It will require a bridge about 700 feet long, and the one they had in view would be substantial as well as ornamental, an iron bridge with a driveway 16 feet wide and the draw 23 to 25 feet in length. The bridge will cross the river obliquely so as to better withstand the swift current.

One carriage and two "jump seat" wagons were at the landing to convey the party to New Gretna, four miles distant to dine.

They were driven over the new road one mile and a half in length built expressly in anticipation of the bridge, and runs through a fine expanse of meadow land. It is built similarly to the one on the Atlantic county side.

A ten minute conference was held in the post office, deciding that Director Currie should call a special meeting of the Board of Freeholders between the 10th and 15th of June to decide whether the bridge is to be built or not, half at the expense of Atlantic county.

When work is started it will require about three months to complete the bridge. – Atlantic Times Mt. Holly Herald 12/13/1890

THE FOLLOWING ITEMS REGARDING JESSE WERE TRANSCRIBED FROM NEWSPAPER ARTICLES:

At a wrestling match at Bridgeport last Thursday between Jesse French and William Leek, the latter was thrown against the corner of a bench cutting his head open. The wound bled profusely. Mt. Holly Herald 5/8/1886

A remonstrance was presented against the granting of a license to Charles R. Deacon to keep a hotel at New Gretna, and the court announced that it would hear the case at once:

The application was presented by Eckard P. Budd, Esq., who stated that it was properly drawn and contained the requisite number of freeholders.

Joseph H. Gaskill, who appeared for the remonstrants, said some of the signers had also signed Catherine McKeen's application. But the main objection was that the hotel had been kept in defiance of the law, and was not a necessity, also, that the applicant had sold liquor on election day, on Sundays and to minors.

Darius Cramer was the first witness. He lives at New Gretna, and said he procured liquor at Deacon's before he was of age on several occasions in company with other minors, Jesse French, William Trueax, Godfrey Darby, and Jon Cramer's son. Witness had played pool there. Witness was of age last April. He only remembered having but one drink there when he was under age. He couldn't remember what it was he drank, whether it was beer, whiskey or "soft stuff."

William Trueax will be of age next month, and couldn't tell how long he had lived at New Gretna. He said that he had bought beer at Deacon's hotel by the drink, also, "apple ginger," but never "treated the house." He had seen several minors drink there, but couldn't tell how long the hotel was kept open on Saturday nights. Pool and dice were played there, and several time disturbances had occurred. Witnesses had played pool there with minors. He was unable to say whether he looked older now than he did a few months ago when he procured the drinks. The only time he saw Godfrey Darby drink there was when the latter sneaked a drink of apple ginger off the bar. Darby got his drink the night the band was there.

John F. Cramer a life-long resident of New Gretna, who said he had known Charles R. Deacon from infancy, then took the stand. He said he was not a Prohibitionist, and took a drink when he felt that he needed it. He had visited Deacon's hotel and seen minors drink there. Jess French used to have his drinks smuggled to him by some one in the crowd, and after that Jess would go up and take his medicine like any one else. Witness's son had also drank there; also a young man from Mount Holly by the name of Holeman; don't know whether his first name was Ernest or not. One took beer and the other whiskey. Pool was played there by two men- one of whom assaulted the Methodist preacher.

Godfrey Darby is between 16 and 17 years old, and is quite boyish looking. Witness had seen drunken men around the hotel on Sundays. Alonzo Johnson and Blanchard

Adams got that way and were stowed away in the hay mow one Sunday. At another Willard Adams got a bottle filled with something that looked like liquor. He thought Deacon's hotel was not necessary; most of the people stopped at Lamson's. Not long since one man went there drunk and came near turning Deacon out of the hotel and taking possession. Mr. Deacon has kept the hotel open until 2 o'clock in the morning.

Jesse French then stood up for the court to see how old he looked. Judge Black than said: "I should think he was thirty-five years old."

Judge Black here interrupted Mr. Budd in his examination by remarking that the law against the sale of liquor to minors applied only to student of colleges and apprentices.

Mr. Gaskill insisted, however, that it was proper to show that minors had procured liquor there, as showing the character of the house.

"You have a feeling against Mr. Deacon haven't you?" asked Mr. Budd.

"Yes, I had a little racket with him." Answered the witness. The particulars, however, were ruled out by the court.

Samuel Johnson testified that he lived in New Gretna, and has a brother Alonzo, who is 19 years of age, and is a carpenter by trade.

Witness had worked for Mr. Deacon and had seen Alonzo drink there despite of his forbidding Mr. Deacon selling him liquor. The latter once said he would sell Alonzo what he wanted when he had the money, but afterwards Mr. Deacon said he would not sell him any more. Witness said Jess French and young Holeman sucked fancy drinks through straws on Sunday night; he didn't know the name of the drinks. Last election day witness had a drink of rye whiskey there, but couldn't tell whether it was paid for or not. Constable Cramer also had a nip that day. It was put down on the slate, as witness has an account there. Witness admitted that he had a difference with Mr. Deacon, and had threatened to have his license taken away.

Alonzo Johnson, 19 years old, said he had visited Deacon's hotel several times, and drank there three or four hundred times during the last three months, and had spent about \$35. Witness had the drinks taken out of his wages on Saturday night when he worked for Mr. Deacon; he had been drunk there, but generally kept on his feet. Witness had procured liquor there on Sundays of Mr. Deacon. The latter had asked witness how old he was, but witness refused to tell him.

Maja B. Mathis testified that he had seen people playing pool for drinks at Deacon's and had seen the man losing the game pay for the drinks. John F. Cramer was engaged in a disturbance there once.

John O. Mathis was called by the defense. He said Deacon kept the best hotel that had ever been kept in the township, and he thought it was needed.

Joseph B. Cramer said the hotel was needed there, and was well kept. He denied Samuel Johnson's statement that he had paid for liquor on election day.

Charles W. Cramer also thought the hotel there was a necessity, and had been well kept. He had heard Samuel Johnson threaten to have Deacon's license taken away from him.

Jesse French testified that he never obtained liquor at Deacon's hotel until he told Mr. Deacon that he was of age. Ernest Holeman, of Mount Holly had once offered Mr. Deacon \$1 in payment of drinks, but the money was handed back to him.

Blanchard Adams denied the statements made by Alonzo Johnson that he had procured liquor there on Sunday.

Charles R. Deacon, the applicant, testified as to the accommodations for the public at his hotel. He admitted having sold liquor to Jesse French, but supposed him to be of age. He denied having sold drinks to Darby, and never allowed pool to be played for drinks.

The case was adjourned until Monday morning.

On Monday morning the concluding argument in the contested license case of Charles R. Deacon was made.

Judge Parker said a majority of the court had decided to grant the license, but wanted it understood that any future violation of the law would be promptly dealt with. Mt. Holly Herald 10/1/1887

GREENBUSH: A picnic was given on the 15th to raise money to furnish the school house, without raising the funds by taxing the citizens. Everything went off pleasantly until

about 10 o'clock at night when a man was seen carrying a five gallon demijohn of whiskey near the grounds. About a dozen young fellows were following him and he dealt out the stuff in a tin cup. As a consequence, they all fell by the wayside and none of them got near the picnic. After the picnic Constable Jesse French and Maja Mathis took care of them and put them in Levi French's new barn to let them sober off. It seems to be the general opinion of those who are in the ring that more liquor is now sold and drank in and around New Gretna than ever before. Some of it comes from West Creek and some from Atlantic City. A favorite refrain with the frolicking party at the picnic was:

"Whiskey is very high in New Gretna Whiskey is very high in New Gretna Whiskey is very high and we got it on the sly And we'll have it if we die, In New Gretna"

Jesse French has assumed the duty of draw tender for the Mullica River iron bridge. Mt. Holly Herald 5/22/1897

Jesse French, a well known resident of Bass River, has been sentenced to nine months' imprisonment in Moyamensing prison, Philadelphia, for forging a check for \$12 on William Atkinson, of Burlington, which he had cashed by a Philadelphia hotel keeper. French's only defense was the only support of his aged father, which will be news to the latter. Mt. Holly Herald 5/2/1899

Burrows M. French (Democrat) was listed as "Poundkeeper" in the April 12th 1864 Town Meeting of Bass River Township along with Daniel McCoy (Republican).

THE FOLLOWING ITEMS REGARDING BURROWS M. WERE TRANSCRIBED FROM NEWSPAPER ARTICLES:

Francis French has sold out his store to his brother Capt. Burrows M. French. The latter was tired of the hard and wearing life of a mariner and proposes to do "shore duty" for the rest of his days. Mt. Holly Herald 9/8/1883

The schooner W.S. French, of Bass River, with a party of twelve excursionists returning from Atlantic City to New Gretna, capsized near Peter's Beach on Monday morning. The passengers were all saved by Yachtsmen and brought ashore. The schooner was finally righted and floated. Mt. Holly Herald 9/8/1883

F. French and Samuel Downs have been in our place for the past 2 days taking account of stock in the store of Francis French, now about changing hands to Capt. B.M. French. The old store is a good stand and we think will be very nicely conducted for time to come as is his intention to make it a first class store. Mt. Holly Herald 9/15/1883

On Saturday evening, there was held at the hotel a delegate meeting. Capt. B.M. French being chosen as delegate to attend the State convention. Mt. Holly Herald 9/15/1883

It is too bad that THE HERALD has no regular correspondent from New Gretna; it isn't because we are all ignorant but because we are all too busy at our daily avocations. If we had any retired doctors, lawyers or merchants, I have no doubt but that you would have plenty of notice from New Gretna and as a word of encouragement to the readers of THE HERALD, I will say that I think ere 1885 shall have drawn there will be several retired merchants in our town, for stores are too thick to thrive. Yet each firm seems to possess some requisites which are essential to success. For instance, B.M. French & Co., have the capital and stand; Adams & Bro., are workers and persevering; Cramer is attentive and very anxious to do business, so anxious that sometimes we are told he sells below cost; perhaps he is like the woman who sold brooms at ½ c. below cost, who when told that she could not be making much, replied: "Oh, I sell so many of them or I would not." H.E. French still keeps at it and does his share. Mt. Holly Herald 12/15/1883

The schooner yacht W.S. French of which Capt. Burrows M. French is the sole owner, has been thoroughly overhauled and is now ready to tackle anything of her dimensions on the river. She can accommodate fishing parties nicely and many a pleasant time in her is anticipated this summer. Mt. Holly Herald 6/27/1885

R. Ashley Mathis, clerk in B.M. French & Co's store and Freeholder Joseph B. Lamson, are candidates for the postmastership. They have been in the field for some months but lately they have kept quiet. As postmaster Adams is dead, something will have to be done now. Mt. Holly Herald 9/5/1885

Capt. Burrows M. French has sold his store at New Gretna to R. Ashley and Howard Mathis. Capt. French prefers a seafaring life, and is now running a vessel between New York and Virginia. Mt. Holly Herald 5/29/1886

Once more, in a most sad manner, has been illustrated the saying that trouble rarely comes singly. Our whole community was shocked, a week ago, with that startling news that comes so frequently to the homes of a sea-faring community – a vessel struck, and lives lost!

This time it touched us more deeply, for two were taken, both from the same household- father and son.

As Capt. Burrows M. French was going down the beach, on the evening of Jan. 27th, his vessel was run into by a foreign steamer, about 15 miles off the Delaware capes, and sunk. All on board were saved excepting Winfield S. French, son of the Capt. who was carried down in the sinking vessel. The Capt. Himself was so seriously injured in the accident that he survived only two days, passing away in the Pennsylvania hospital in Phila. His body was buried from his home in New Gretna on Sunday last. Capt. French was widely known throughout this community, having lived both in Tom's River and Barnegat as well as in New Gretna, and especially among sea-faring men.

Born in 1837 on his father's farm on the Bass River, he was early given a liking for the water by the fact that his father was a ship-carpenter as well as a farmer, and as each of his oldest sons became of age, secured for them the charge of one of the vessels of his own building. Capt. French, took command of the last vessel that his father built. He started his sea-faring life at the age of 19, and has followed the water ever since, having acquired much experience, and being esteemed by all ship owners as one of the ablest Captains in the coast trade.

He was married about 33 years ago to Miss. Mary Cavileer, who survived him, and has had three children; one, Winfield, was carried down in the sinking vessel at the time his father received his fatal injuries; the other two, a son and a daughter, are both married. At the time of his death arrangements were being made for the marriage of Winfield which was to have occurred in about two months. He had left home to make his first trip with his father only the Friday before, joined the vessel in New York on Saturday and on Tuesday evening he met his death.

In 1852 when Capt. French's father died, there was left a family of ten children and their mother, with the exception of the mother's death in 1878, this is the first death in that family circle.

A large company of friends gathered together to follow the body to its last earthly resting place- and many more who had been associated with him in the sea-faring business were only deterred from being present because of their inability to reach the place.

Six of his nephews, Frances French, Jesse French, Suwarrow M. French, Clinton French, Earnest Bodine, and E. Russell Cramer, acted as pall bearers.

He was buried on Sunday Feb. 1st in the Miller Cemetery in New Gretna.

# THE COLLISION AS DESCRIBED BY AN EYE WITNESS:

. . . John Adams, who was cook with Capt. French on the schooner Minnie & Gussie said, "Just one week ago, we started from Sandy Hook with a South wind, everything was going a long lovely when down toward the capes Wednesday night about six o'clock, we saw a steamer's mast-head light which afterward proved to be the Macedonia. In a short time the port or red light was seen and as she came nearer both red and green lights showed, which told us she was coming straight toward us until within a minute by porting the helm instead of putting it starboard which would have cleared us showed to us plainly the red light which we knew well meant destruction. The steamer struck us just forward of the mizzen chain cutting a large hole in the schooner and damaged the steamer somewhat, the moment the two boats came together, some of us boarded the steamer, and as soon as they swung aside each other, the balance of the crew boarded her with the exception of Capt. French who went up the rigging, as the water rose, and was taken off of the mast-head by the steamer's life boat, and Winnie who had not left the wheel, and at the last minute ran down to the cabin, and nothing more was seen of him. The mate of the steamer said the green light on the schooner was not burning and I showed it to him when she was going down, and to-day here we are at the funeral of the Captain who died from his injuries, and the son lies at the bottom of the sea"

Tuckerton Beacon; Jan., 1891

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While off the Delaware capes on Tuesday evening the Macedonia, under a full headway, collided with the schooner Minnie and Gussie, completely splitting her in halves, killing Second Mate Winfield S. French and seriously injuring Captain French. Three other members of the crew were barely rescued from the waves. Captain French had both legs badly cut, one arm broken, and internal injuries. He had been taken to the hospital, and it is believed that he will recover.

The Minnie and Gussie laden with 300 tons of phosphate sailed from New York Sunday night last bound to Norfolk, and met with favorable weather all along the coast. About 6:30 Tuesday night Cape Henlopen, bearing north northwest, fifteen miles while the schooner was on the port tack heading west southwest, the steamer coming directly upon her was sighted.

Abiding strictly to the law governing such cases, Captain French held his course throughout, but it is evident that those on board the steamer did not see the schooner.

As the steamer approached, her name could nearly be distinguished by the forward lookout. Suddenly those on board the steamship sighted the schooner, and hove the helm down hard aport in effort to throw the ship's head inshore and clear of the craft.

The vessels were in too close proximity and before the huge tramp felt her port helm she crashed into the Minnie and Gussie's port quarter and severed it completely from the other portion of the vessel. Huge planks and beams were smashed into splinters for hundreds of feet around. Efforts on the part of

the schooner's crew to launch the lifeboats proved futile as their vessel was fast going under them. As a last resort they took to the rigging and climbed aloft, keeping pace with the water as the vessel went from beneath them. Captain French, who was nearly unconscious from injuries received hauled himself aloft, although almost covered with blood.

When the schooner struck bottom, leaving a portion of the topmast heads above water, this saved the crew. On the rigging they perched themselves and were rescued after much difficulty by the steamer's boat.

At the time of the accident Second Mate French hurried down into the cabin to save some valuables. While down here he must have been pinioned to death by the crushed beams or caught so that it was impossible for him to escape. He was thirty years of age and the captain's son. On reaching the Delaware Breakwater medical assistance was sent for, and Dr. Orr came off and dressed the wounds on Captain French.

At the time the Macedonia crashed into the Minnie and Gussie she was steering southeast three-quarter east to clear Fenwick's Island before shaping her course for Cape Henry. The night was bright and the chief officer was on the bridge with the helmsman. Captain Leisk was in the chart room at the time, but rushed on deck on hearing the excitement just in time to see both vessels come together. They collided with such force that the Macedonia's iron bows on the port were smashed in and the forward compartments filled with water.

Captain Leisk feels keenly the accident. On the outward passage Captain Leisk was knocked down by a heavy sea and had barely recovered from the effects when this occurred.

The Minnie and Gussie was owned in New York by J. Blenderman and was built in Tottenville, L.I., in 1883. She was valued at \$15,000 and her cargo at \$10,000. The crew saved none of their effects.

Winfield S. French was in Mount Holly on Saturday calling on a number of friends, and left in the afternoon for New York to go on board the ill-fated vessel. He was a man of genial manners, and his death called forth many expressions of regret. Mt. Holly Herald 1/31/1891

# New Gretna:

Never in the existence of this town was such startling news received as the reports which the daily papers of Thursday, January 29th brought to us. "The schooner Minnie and Gussie run down by the steamer Macedonia - Winfield S. French lost in the collision and Capt. B. M. French badly hurt."

Tears trickled down the cheeks of their neighbors as they read the sad news, and the person's heart in this community that did not have a feeling of sorrow would be hard to find, and as could see groups of friends standing around and conversing over the sad, sad report, it was an easy matter to tell how heart broken every one was, while the death of Winfield was a severe blow and the shock the people had received, had scarcely passed over when a telegram, announcing the death of Capt. B.M. French was received, you can scarcely imagine the feelings of this community.

Capt. B. M. French leaves a wife and one son, Capt. Walter French, and one daughter, Mrs. J. W. Harris. The day Capt. French died, his wife and daughter were in Philadelphia, and within one block of where the Captain expired, wholly unaware of the accident which had befallen him. Mrs. French and daughter arrived at New Gretna at about 9 o'clock, that evening, and at their home received the sad news. Mrs. French's grief cannot be explained on paper, and while the rest of the family are heartbroken over the affair, they on account of Mrs. French, are required to put the best appearance forward, she requiring their almost united attention.

Capt. French's body was brought home on Friday. The funeral took place at his residence on Sunday, at 12 M. Six nephews acted as pall bearers, viz Clinton French, Jesse French, S. M. French, Francis French, Earnest Bodine and E. Russell Cramer. A large number of relatives and acquaintances from all along the shore, also from New York, were present.

Capt. FrenCh was a very large man, his weight being 310 pounds, and had followed the sea all of his life. He was a good neighbor and a man with a big heart and would accommodate his fellow man when an opportunity offered itself to do so. The family have the sympathy of the entire community in their great trial.

Winfield S. French was a single young man, about 30 years of age, and had served in the Board of Freeholders for two years, 1888-89. He had followed the sea but little, having mostly staid at home taking charge there. On Friday morning, January 23d. he left New Gretna for New York to make a trip or two with his father. On Tuesday evening, January 27th, at about 6.30 P.M. when 15 miles off Cape Henlopen, Winfield was at the helm, the steamer Macedonia collided with the Minnie and Gussie, tearing a big hole in her side, from which she soon filled with water and went to the bottom in some sixty feet of water. There were seven men on board, five of which made their escape to the steamer.

Capt. French, with a broken arm and limbs badly cut and bruised, managed to climb up the rigging and was taken off. - The schooner was some seven minutes in sinking. Winfield was on her deck and for four or five minutes walking around apparently unconcerned. The others called to him and tried to persuade him to make an effort to save his life, but received no response from him; suddenly he made a rush for the cabin and was seen no more. No doubt the poor fellow had lost all presence of mind. Winfield was kind and courteous to all. Everybody liked him an many a tear has been dropped on account of his sad end. No boy was ever better then he was to his mother; always, up to the few days before his death, being at home and ever willing and ready to assist her. Winfield was a model young man. - Arrangements have been made to get the body. This will be a comfort to his mother, relatives and friends, and it is the desire of all that it may be accomplished. - Mrs. French and the relatives have the sympathy of all the community and may the good Saviour, who has seen best to afflict, may he also comfort and protect them. [newspaper & date unknown, probably Mount Holly Herald]

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Business Section at New Gretna Swept By Fire - Post Office, Store, Restaurant and Pool Room in Ashes: Result of Mid-Night Blaze - The store owned and occupied by Mr. Cramer, was an old landmark of New Gretna and was built by the late Levi French more than a half century ago. In the building Mr. French carried on a general merchandise business for many years. Later the business was taken over by Francis French, then Burr French and Howard Mathis. Later Mr. Mathis and his brother Ashley formed the partnership firm of Mathis Brothers and when this firm dissolved the business was continued by Ashley Mathis until his death, when the property was bought by the present owner. THE FOLLOWING ITEMS REGARDING WINFIELD S. WERE TRANSCRIBED FROM NEWSPAPER ARTICLES:

The caucus meeting was held on Saturday and passed off very quietly. Winfield S. French, to the surprise of every one, received the nomination for Chosen Freeholder. The defeated candidate bore himself like a man, and had no hard words for any one. The nominees were afterwards tendered a serenade by the band. Mt. Holly Herald 3/7/1885

Some of our boys are not of the wayward sort, but occasionally take a hand at elections (for instance, think of last November), and they feel willing to wager and give odds that Winfield S. French will be the man to succeed Lamson as Freeholder from Bass River township. Mt. Holly Herald 2/5/1887

Burlington county was invaded Thursday last by Atlantic county Board of Freeholders. Director Currie was in command of the company.

The expedition was organized to view the site of the proposed Mullica river bridge near Chestnut Neck. Leaving Absecon in carriages at 11 A.M., the party drove through not very picturesque nor mountainous scenery to Chestnut Neck arriving there at 12:30. They inspected the road which is being built and is nearly finished to the Mullica river bank as an extension of the Port Republic road from the farm of John W. Johnson and through that of Capt. T.E. French. It consists of a foundation of pine log trimming, apparently coming from the mill, varied on both sides and filled in with meadow muck, to be topped with gravel.

Crossing the historic battlefield of Chestnut Neck the company swooped down upon Capt. Daniel Rose's oyster scow, which for then once was turned into a private yacht or ferry on which the invaders were soon safely landed in Burlington county. On that further shore they were met by Winfield S. French, William R. Lipponcott and Horace G. Ireland, the committee appointed by Burlington county to receive them.

Winfield S. French, as chairman, explained that the site was the narrowest part of the Mullica river which they found feasible for the building of the bridge. The channel was 28

feet deep, and the tide very swift during its rise and fall. It will require a bridge about 700 feet long, and the one they had in view would be substantial as well as ornamental, an iron bridge with a driveway 16 feet wide and the draw 23 to 25 feet in length. The bridge will cross the river obliquely so as to better withstand the swift current.

One carriage and two "jump seat" wagons were at the landing to convey the party to New Gretna, four miles distant to dine.

They were driven over the new road one mile and a half in length built expressly in anticipation of the bridge, and runs through a fine expanse of meadow land. It is built similarly to the one on the Atlantic county side.

A ten minute conference was held in the post office, deciding that Director Currie should call a special meeting of the Board of Freeholders between the 10th and 15th of June to decide whether the bridge is to be built or not, half at the expense of Atlantic county.

When work is started it will require about three months to complete the bridge. – Atlantic Times

Mount Holly, N.J. June 13th, 1888 Catherine McKeen, Madam

In reply to your [letter] of a few days ago which I had overlooked, I will state that there is no doubt but you may sell your liquors by the quart where you now live. Yet there is a strong doubt as to your

right to sell by the drink at any place except the house you lived in when your license was granted. You could rebuild on the old foundation and sell after you rebuild until the license expires.

I don't think that any body would trouble you if you sold by the drink provided you have Hotel accommodations. Or that the court would notice a complaint if you were complained of under the circumstances, But of course there is a risk about it. And you will be the best judge as to whether you will take it.

The Draft, for Burlington County, commenced in Trenton, on Thursday, with the following results: BASS RIVER- Enrolled 125 - Deficiency, 27 - Drawn, 54. Levi M. French was the 14th name on the list. Mount Holly Herald 4/8/1865

The Rev. Mr. Boswell, pastor of the M.E. church at Bass River was very severe on Joseph P. Adams on Sunday last. He accused him of being very religious and temperate when at home but when away, the reverse. Mr. Adams has had some trouble with his church we believe, and is not now a member. While Mr. Boswell could not call Levi French either a professor of religion or an advocate of the temperance cause, he gave him credit for not being two-faced. The charge of hypocrisy on the part of Joseph P. Adams coming from the pulpit will seriously hurt him. Mt. Holly Herald 10/31/1874

The schooner Rob Roy, captain Josiah Cale, owned by Rapp & Sons of New York, and running between that city and Bass River, went ashore opposite the lighthouse while trying to come in the inlet on Wednesday night, the 1st inst. She was loaded with store goods, feed, &c., the principal part of which belonged to L. & F. French, of Tuckerton and New Gretna. There being a heavy swell on at the time, the schooner was thrown up on the beach so that the crew could walk ashore dry-footed on the low water. She immediately bilged and before the cargo was taken out it was damaged to about 50 per cent of its value. There were two barrels of whiskey on board which it is needless to say were promptly saved. The schooner will be a total loss. Mt. Holly Herald 9/11/1875

The schooner Cora loaded with hoop poles one day last week at Bridgeport, Wading River, for New York. When off Squan on Monday about 4 A.M. she began to leak badly and was at once driven ashore opposite lifesaving station No. 11 and is now a total wreck. The surf boat was launched at 9 A.M., the wreck boarded at 9:05, the crew taken off and the boat returned to the beach at 9:30. The Cora was an old boat and was manned as follows: J. Frank McKeen, captain, Samuel McKeen, mate, Jesse Williams, Joshua Kaywood and William Adams, sailors. The hoop poles belonged to Levi French and were worth about \$550. The Cora was owned by Samuel McKeen, John Cavileer and Samuel Crowley. The whole outfit is a total loss. Mt. Holly Herald 11/18/1875

At the sale of Levi French's property on Saturday, corn brought 59 and 60c, cows from \$27 to \$32, hay \$6.60 to \$6.80, potatoes 48c. Mt. Holly Herald 12/15/1883

Capt. Levi French's sloop yacht Warden has just been overhauled and painted up with the best of materials. She is now in first class order, a perfect model of mechanism and floats on the water like a thing of life and beauty. Levi expects to come down in a few weeks and live over again the scenes of his younger days and play some of his old tricks with fish. He is an expert fisherman and takes delight in relating stories about fishing and sailing and Capt. Tom's drumfishing. Mt. Holly Herald 6/27/1885

On Friday last Commissioners sold the real estate of the late Franklin Adams in the townships of Bass River and Little Egg Harbor. The hotel property at New Gretna brought \$1500, and was purchased by Mrs. Adams, Blanchard Adams [Franklin's brother] and Mrs. Deacon [Franklin's daughter]. The "Half Moon" meadows were sold to Mrs. Deacon for \$250; 46 acres of meadow land to Mrs. Adams for \$782; a lot in New Gretna to Blanchard Adams for \$200; four acres in New Gretna to four of the heirs for \$400; 9 acres of cedar swamp to Willard Adams for \$45 per acre; also, a cranberry bog for \$11, and a house and lot at New Gretna for \$720 to Willard Adams. Levi French paid \$2.85 per acre for six acres of cedar swamp and the same price for 24 acres of upland, and \$130.10 for a lot of land at Tuckerton. James Speck paid \$159 for three acres of cedar swamp. Alfred Palmer got 42 acres of woodland for \$2.55 per acre, and John L. Marshall bought 98 acres of land near the Lemunyon Place for twenty-five cents per acre. Mt. Holly Herald 9/5/1885

That New Gretna Affair: The Republican papers have been working themselves into a great state of indignation overt the report that at a meeting at New Gretna last week a colored man got up and announced himself in favor of Cleveland. They said the colored man was fired up with Democratic rum, and that the crowd badgered Senator Carter about free rum and groaned at Charles T. Parker.

But one story is always good until another is told. When the Republican speakers reached New Gretna they were offered the use of the hall by J.B. Lamson. But it was refused, and Senator Carter, the high priest of temperance, with Senator Nichols and Mr. Parker went to the barroom of Deacon's hotel to speak, preferring that to the hall. Under the circumstances the crowd could not be expected to be exclusive.

When Senator Nichols spoke on the tariff he said the surplus did not need to be reduced.

"Then why did the Senate introduce a bill to reduce it?" said someone in the crowd. This made the speaker angry, and some of the hoodlums outside the barroom began to groan. The next minute some one offered three cheers for Levi French, and they were given. But there were no groans for Charles T. Parker. The people there felt kindly toward him, and had no desire to groan at him. And the colored man didn't get fired up on Democratic whiskey unless that is the kind sold over at Deacon's bar.

The fact was the speakers did not make a favorable impression, and were sore over the fact, and ready to put the blame on some one. Mt. Holly Herald 10/27/1888

That New Gretna Affair. New Gretna, N.J. October 30, Mr. Editor: The statements as published in some of our county papers concerning the disturbance of a Republican meeting held at this place a few days ago are greatly exaggerated.

The speaking took place in a small room about 15 feet square connected with a barroom with no partition between, so that many present had to stand in the barroom to hear, and also many on the outside, mostly boys. The speaker started out with gross misrepresentations as to the Democratic party and its policy. This caused some Democrats to ask a few questions, and the manner in which they were evaded or attempted to be answered were really amusing and surprising from the fact that the speaker had the honor of once being a State Senator. The questions that were put were for information and not intended to insult or disturb the meeting, and it soon became evident that the questions were bothersome, not in the way of disturbing the meeting, but to give them proper consideration. We didn't think any noise would have occurred had all present been able to get in the house, but from the fact that many were on the outside, mostly boys, and they seeing that the questions put staggered the parties, gave vent to their feelings. As to the disturbance caused by the negro appearing in the room, what he did was done after Mr. Nichols and Mr. Carter were through speaking. He slipped in the room and sainted those present by saying: "Good evening gentlemen when I came to this meeting I was a Republican, but after listening to those men talk I have made up my mind to vote the Democratic

ticket," and then slipped out. He had not been drinking "Democratic rum" as was stated, as that kind is not dealt out in our tavern, neither had he touched a drop of any other kind or even been in Deacon's barroom that evening.

On the outside, three cheers were given for Cleveland and Thurman, which was followed by groans, and I have no reason to think they were intended for the candidates present. "This was the first incident that ever occurred in our midst to mar the pleasantness of a Republican meeting and for which the Democratic party, as a party, in not responsible. We cannot help but notice the difference in the statements in the Republican organs between what Democrats may do and our Republican friends.

How would it look to give a correct statement of the manner in which Democrats have been treated by our Republican friends from an adjoining township?

More than one rotten egg and more than one brick has been thrown; more than one fence and more than one rope has been stretched for the purpose of injuring the Democrats when on the way to and from political meetings out of this town, and many of the wagons contained ladies, but I will not attempt to lay the blame on the rank and file of the Republican party or injure those Republicans that are innocent and above doing such things.

We have inquired very diligently as to what the Republican leaders did towards making Mr. Parker acquainted with the Democrats and find they never attempted either before or after the meeting to introduce him to the Democrats. Had they done so many a Democrat in this town would have taken Mr. Parker by his hand and shown him just as good treatment as ever any Republican ever did Mr. French in Burlington. That the Republicans could have had much better accommodations at the New Gretna house for their meeting is an undeniable fact, even though the proprietor is a Democrat. Ballinger made many friends by being introduced to many Republicans that formed a good opinion of him and when Levi French entered the room the people showed they appreciated him and are proud if his record, and no one feels more hurt than does Mr. French that the least thing should have happened to cause the Republican candidate or his friends to feel hurt, and no fair minded man can blame Mr. French for what may have occurred. Mr. French's pleasant manner and courteous treatment to all that know him is above criticism, and no man that is a true friend to Mr. French will vote against him because of some other person's wrong doing. 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GREENBUSH: A picnic was given on the 15th to raise money to furnish the school house, without raising the funds by taxing the citizens. Everything went off pleasantly until about 10 o'clock at night when a man was seen carrying a five gallon demijohn of whiskey near the grounds. About a dozen young fellows were following him and he dealt out the stuff in a tin cup. As a consequence, they all fell by the wayside and none of them got near the picnic. After the picnic Constable Jesse French and Maja Mathis took care of them and put them in Levi French's new barn to let them sober off. It seems to be the general opinion of those who are in the ring that more liquor is now sold and drank in and around New Gretna than ever before. Some of it comes from West Creek and some from Atlantic City. A favorite refrain with the frolicking party at the picnic was:

"Whiskey is very high in New Gretna Whiskey is very high in New Gretna Whiskey is very high and we got it on the sly And we'll have it if we die, In New Gretna"

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The shares of stock subscribed for the new town hall foot up 263 which will be run up to 400 or more. Levi French has bought the old Adams hotel property and after he obtains a clear title to it through the courts, will sell it to the hall association and the building will be erected there. This is the most central part of the village. The withdrawal of several of the subscribers because the site didn't suit them has not interfered with the work. Building will be started next winter. Mt. Holly Herald 8/1/1891

A rousing Democratic meeting was held here on Saturday evening at which there was considerable enthusiasm displayed for the whole ticket. Owing to the fact that the town hall is not finished, the meeting was held in the open air in front of J.B. Lamson's. It was presided over by Levi French who introduced the candidates. A. Henry White, candidate for Assembly, made a stirring address, and was applauded. He was followed by Prosecutor E.P. Budd, who spoke for over half an hour on the issues of the hour and the merits of the Democratic candidates. Charles P. Ballinger, Democratic candidate for Surrogate also made a short speech. All received a cordial welcome by the people of New Gretna. Howard Mathis, our candidate for Auditor, lives here, and will poll a large vote, as he is well and favorably known. Mt. The Democratic primary was held at New Gretna on Saturday afternoon. Levi French was elected chairman. The principal contests were over the office of Freeholder and Township Committeeman. The aspirants for the nomination for Freeholder were George L. Cramer and Marshall A. Loveland. The latter was successful, the vote being 90 to 97. The contest for Township Committeeman was between James E. Cramer and Joseph B. Lamson. The latter got the prize. S.M. French was renominated for Clerk, B.F. Headley for Justice of the Peace, Charles C. Cramer also for Justice of the Peace. The Republicans will put up William C. Irons for Freeholder. Mt. Holly Herald 3/5/1892

The newly elected board of directors of the New Gretna Building and Loan association met in the town hall on the 24th and organized by electing Levi French, president; Augustus Cramer, vice president; John W. Harris, secretary; Mark W. Adams, treasurer; who compose the board of directors together with Chalkley S. Cramer, James M. Darby, C. Harry Cramer, Edwin C. Sooy, Albert F. Cramer, William E. Mathis, Reuben A. Loveland, Ashton Lamson, Joseph B. Lamson, Watson D. Cramer, Marshall A. Loveland. The past year has been one of the most prosperous of the association. Three series are now running as follows: 1st paid in, \$30.50; paid in, \$18.50; 3d paid in, \$6.50. The first series gained \$3.47. Mt. Holly Herald 4/7/1894

New Gretna has organized a branch of the Republic Savings & Loan Association. The following officers are: President, Levi French, Vice President, Rev. J.W. Tower; Secretary & Treasurer, M. W. Adams. The tax rate this year in Bass River township was \$1.65; in Washington \$2. Ex County Clerk Levi French is the heaviest resident tax-payer in Bass River township. The recent rumors about his being sold out by the sheriff grew out of a sale in which he was only acting as agent for Joseph Wharton to perfect the title to the Harrisville property. Mt. 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Business Section at New Gretna Swept By Fire - Post Office, Store, Restaurant and Pool Room in Ashes: Result of Mid-Night Blaze

### POPULATION HELPLESS IN ZERO WEATHER AND NO WATER. BATTLE TO SAVE TOWN HALL

The population of New Gretna were given a shock Friday night when at about 10 o'clock the store of Milton Cramer caught fire. The fire started from some unknown cause after Mr. Cramer closed for the evening and when discovered was beyond control, citizens who gathered to witness the spectacle were helpless to combat the flames as the zero weather had cut off the water supply and with practically no fire-fighting apparatus little could be done to save the property.

The fire quickly spread to the old hotel building and the post office and with the store all were reduced to ashes in less than two hours.

For some time it looked as if the big K. of P. [Knights of Pythias] Hall would be destroyed but heroic effort of a volunteer force of firemen saved this building. It caught on fire on several occasions.

The store owned and occupied by Mr. Cramer, was an old land-mark of New Gretna and was built by the late Levi French more than a half century ago. In the building Mr. French carried on a general merchandise business for many years. Later the business was taken over by Francis French, then Burr French and Howard Mathis. Later Mr. Mathis and his brother Ashley formed the partnership firm of Mathis Brothers and when this firm dissolved the business was continued by Ashley Mathis until his death, when the property was bought by the present owner.

The old hotel property is also an old land mark with an interesting history and many gay times have taken place there that can be recalled by the older residents of that town.

This old building was erected by the late Frank Adams and later owned by his son-in-law, Charles Deacon. Since then it has had a long string of occupants in different lines of business. At the time of the fire the building was occupied by Levi Downs and was owned by Fred Miner.

The post office building was owned by Howard Mathis. The store and stock was covered by \$2,500 insurance, the hotel \$1,000 and the post office was a total loss, there being no insurance. [Unknown newspaper, 1/10/1917]

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The Board of Freeholders had a lively discussion over the personal bills of some of the far-away members on Tuesday. That of Levi French of Bass River was the one taken as a test case. Since it has been decided that the only pay a Freeholder is entitled to is \$2.00 per day with no allowance for travelling or other expenses, it is a loss to those Freeholders who live on the shore to attend meetings. Mr. French stated that it cost him \$5 to attend each meeting for fare alone. The Board, by a vote of 13 - 12, decided to pay the bill of Mr. French. It is no more than right that those members should receive their actual traveling expenses but the law is certainly against such a course. Their only redress is to have the law amended by the Legislature so that all such expenses and their day's services may be covered. It will be difficult to draw the line however. The law is often harsh in its workings and it especially so in the cases of our Freeholders from the shore. Of late years the honor of being a

Freeholder has been somewhat belittled by the unruly and disreputable conduct of some unworthy members, so that all talk about the honor of the position compensating for the pecuniary loss does not amount to much. Mt. Holly Herald – date unknown

On behalf of Thomas J. Gaskill, Arnold Cramer and about 300 South Jersey oystermen William C. French of Camden, last week through attorney general Robert McCarter began suits in ejectment against the Sooy Oyster company, James Gale, Hilliard Gale, Benjamin Chew and others who hold valuable riparian grants in the Mullica river and Great bay. This is the latest of the oyster war that has been agitating the shore counties since October and the action taken is in accordance with an opinion recently filed by Vice-chancellor Learning. The trouble began in October when the oystermen claiming that the Riparian commission had given favored corporations and individuals grants on natural oyster beds contrary to the act of 1888 descended upon the usurpers and a pitched battle ensued. There were a number of broken heads and suits at law were instituted in the civil and criminal courts. A number of the latter are to be disposed of at the September term of court in Atlantic county. Some weeks ago counsel for the Sooy company secured from Vice-chancellor Learning an order restraining the oystermen from trespassing upon the corporation's land. In giving decision in the matter however the vice-chancellor averred that it would be possible in a court of law to show that the grants had been improperly made. It is in consequence of this that the present action in ejectment has been begun. It is the contention of the oystermen that the commission had no right to give away property where natural beds have existed for generations. It is declared that the issue means the life or death as far as the vocation is concerned of the 300 ovstermen and their families. Mt. Holly Herald 8/29/1908

WILLIAM C. FRENCH, FORMER JUDGE, DIES: DEMOCRATIC LEADER WAS ON CAMDEN CITY

DISTRICT BENCH FOR 18 YEARS - STRICKEN AT SUPPER

Former Judge William C. French, who was for eighteen years on the bench of the Camden City District Court, and was Democratic leader of Camden county, died of apoplexy at his home, 643 Park Ave, Collingswood, last night.

The retired Jurist two weeks ago suffered an attack of acute Indigestion and heart disease, but was reported on the road to recovery. He was stricken last night, while having super in bed. His brother and law partner, Samuel P. French, and a nurse were with him. Before his children could be summoned from downstairs: however, he was dead.

Judge French, who was fifty-nine, received his early education in the public schools of Camden and Atlantic City.

He studied law by a correspondence course and was admitted to the bar in 1898. He was connected first with the law office of Richard G. Miller, and in 1905 formed a partnership with his brother. He left his practice in 1911 when he was appointed to the bench, but resumed It, after his retirement from the bench eighteen years later.

In his youth he was an able boxer and played as captain of the Camden foot ball team when it defeated the University of Pennsylvania and Mi.. Holly, then New Jersey champions, in the early nineties.

Judge French was one of the three men responsible for the nomination of Woodrow Wilson as Governor of New Jersey when at the Democratic convention in Trenton he ran counter to James Smith, then State leader, who wanted the nomination of the Supreme Court Justice Frank S. Katzenbnch.

His wife, Adelaide L. Pinnard, died during the epidemic of influenza in 1918. He is survived by six children.

The funeral will be at 1 o'clock Saturday from the Port Republic Methodist Episcopal Church, in Atlantic county. The body will be on view from 2 until 11 P. M. on Friday at the home in Camden. [The Evening Bulletin- Feb. 26, 1930]

Suwarrow French and Bilderback are also at loggerheads and it is reported that Bilderback dared Freeholder Lamson and Clerk R. Furman McKeen out behind the meeting house to fight. Bass River generally has something to agitate her citizens but it doesn't look altogether right to see and hear of so much quarreling on the part of church members and the pastor at the head of it. The good book teaches a different way of life even of the pastor is insulted or aggrieved. But poor, weak human nature seems to insert itself at every opportunity. Mt. Holly Herald 5/28/1887

We see that the libelous fellow who wrote concerning Mr. Bilderback that he had not the legal right to perform the marriage ceremony, may have a hard road to hoe. My! How much lawing there will be from New Gretna at the next term of court! Rev. P.W. Bilderback has been bound over to court for assaulting Suwar M. French Secretary of the M.E. church Young People's meetings (at the time of the assault) Charles E. Munson, of Philadelphia, for assaulting Rev. P. W. Bilderback and that very small fellow (of a libelous nature) pictured out in astonishing language, style and gesture. How much better would it have been for him had he written a letter of praise concerning himself than to cause trouble. Still, perhaps, he lacks the brass that a man requires to blow his own horn. We know of a man that published in one of our county papers news that was calculated to injure not only a father but a mother and her children and perchance he too should be punished, but it makes all the difference whose ox is gored. Mt. Holly Herald 7/30/1887

The election passed off very quietly here on Tuesday. The only contest was over the position of Township Committeeman and Inspector of election. John W. Harris was elected on the committee over Hiram E. French by a vote of 101 to 89. For Inspector Chalkley C. Sears was elected over Willard F. Adams. Suwarrow M. French was elected Clerk; Howard Mathis, Collector; E. Russell Cranmer, Assessor; Joseph B. Cranmer and Albert A. Cranmer, Constables; Joseph P. Adams, Justice of the Peace. The election for road overseers was held on Thursday. Mt. Holly Herald 3/6/1889

The main fight here was at the caucus meeting in which both parties make a contest for the nominations. A union ticket is thus made up, composed of members of both parties, and is the only one voted on election day. The officers elected are: Town Clerk, S.M. French; Judge of Election, William T. Cramer; Inspectors of Election, C. Sears, S.A. Mortimer; Chosen Freeholder, C.W. Mathis; Collector, Howard Mathis; Assessor, M. W. Adams; Township Committee, Hiram E. The Democratic primary was held at New Gretna on Saturday afternoon. Levi French was elected chairman. The principal contests were over the office of Freeholder and Township Committeeman. The aspirants for the nomination for Freeholder were George L. Cramer and Marshall A. Loveland. The latter was successful, the vote being 90 to 97. The contest for Township Committeeman was between James E. Cramer and Joseph B. Lamson. The latter got the prize. S.M. French was renominated for Clerk, B.F. Headley for Justice of the Peace, Charles C. Cramer also for Justice of the Peace. The Republicans will put up William C. Irons for Freeholder. Mt. Holly Herald 3/5/1892
